OUR VERSATILITY

In 2011 the Klamath Falls Airtanker Base continued to provide operational and logistics needs to the widest variety of firefighting aircraft in the program including:

Administrative Support

"Base personnel provide contract administrative services to the National Airtanker Contract through timekeeping and reporting and cost reporting services to incidents.

Operations

Retardant services are provided by a vendor contracted under the National Fire Retardant Contract.

Ramp and logistic support services are provided primarily by a local militia of call when needed personnel consisting of Forest Service, BLM employees and casual hires.

Information

The base is the aircrews liaison with dispatch and provides briefings, local information and logistics support.

Safety and Security

The base continued to provide for the safety and security of personnel and aircraft.

SEASON ACTIVITY

The Klamath Falls Airtanker Base opened for business on May 30, 2011 with the start of the full service retardant contract at the base.



The first activity of the season occurred somewhat unexpectedly on June 8th when tanker 75 a Cal Fire S2 came all the way from Paso Robles to reload once for the Cougar fire on the Modoc NF.

It would be two months almost to the day before the base would see any more activity. On August 9th the Anna fire brought in two Convair 580 airtankers operated by Conair under an Alaska State contract.



The two airtankers each delivered one load to the fire.


